The Kellogg Legacy. The W.K. Kellogg Arabian Horse Center's current breeding philosophy was established in 1964 when Norman K. Dunn was appointed as Manager of the Horse Department. Professor Dunn surmised that the Arabian breed was surpassing the insular breeding program at Cal Poly, and proposed that Cal Poly mares be bred to outside stallions.

Later, he founded the Kellogg Arabian Ranch and made it into a renowned establishment for the breeding of Arabian horses. *Nejdme, Mariam's second dam, was a Hamidie import mare and was the first Arabian registered with The Arabian Horse Registry of America, Inc., known at the time as The Arabian Horse Club of America. Mariam was sold by the Kellogg Ranch on January 17, 1931, at the age of 15. Her buyer was William Randolph Hearst.

THE HAYDEN RANCH, 1913-1941 The Hayden ranch was founded in 1869 by Major Jacob Downing, organizer of the First Colorado Cavalry Company D during the Civil War. Downing built a 1,500 acre ranch to raise Arabian thoroughbred horses. The ranch also included cattle, fruit trees, and a large brick ranch house.

He was bred by the W. K. Kellogg Institute; then his dam, *Ferda, was sold to cattle rancher and Arabian horse breeder Fred Vanderhoof. Ferseyn was later owned by former Kellogg Ranch manager Herbert H. Reese, who described him: "Ferseyn exemplifies the typical Arabian with his classic head, delicate alert ears and large expressive eyes...."

History. Later in 1949, Kellogg donated the ranch to the state of California, requiring that the property would be used for educational purposes, the herd of Arabian horses must be maintained, and the horse shows would continue. Title to the then 813-acre (3.3 km²) ranch and horses was passed to the State of California.
